

Why Did Jesus Have to Die?

If we're going to do this question any kind of justice we need to put it into a wider context.

Our dominion over creation is to be expressed in such a way as to reflect the character and nature of God to all creation.



Adam, as the first human being, represents all of humanity before God. In his	
likeness to God he stands as mediator between God and His creation but as a	
created being he is mediator between creation and its God.	
That takes us through Genesis 1 and 2 and brings us to chapter 3, to the scene that	
is often called the fall.	
Genesis 3:1-6	
As the choice is between two apparent goods the decision comes down to a	
question of who do you trust. Who is telling the truth? Who really has my best interests at heart?	
The serpent know what's at stake and enters into a program of character	
assassination	



Adam and Eve make the wrong choice, they choose to trust the serpent over God, to put their faith in him rather than in the God that created them for relationship with himself, to trust the word of Satan over the word of God.

Two Consequences:

1.	Through their choice, Adam and Eve implicitly agree with the serpent. In their action they are calling God a liar, accusing Him of representing Himself falsely attempting to deceive them about His true character and nature, and seeking to control them.
ļ	It's this attack upon the character and nature of God that's at the heart of sin. It's this attitude towards God that we all reveal in our actions.
	Sin is far more serious, heinous, and insidious than simply breaking the arbitrary les of some wooly bearded cosmic judge. Far more than the breaking of rules sin is the violation of a person. Sin is the violation of the person of God!
As	s a result of their attack upon the character and nature of God, Adam and Eve have made themselves enemies of God deserving of punishment. Part of God's judgement upon them is that they are separated from God



man is separated from God as a result of sin but he was created for the very purpose of relationship with God.		
Because Adam is the first human, and as such our representative and mediator, all		
human kind from Adam onwards share in the damage Adam's choice brings to the		
human race. We all suffer separation from God and the death that it brings.		
2. As a result of Adam's choice we have become enslaved. Through the deception		
of Satan, the human race have become his captives.		
As we are his captives, he is our captor and rules over us as such.

The Problem in a nutshell:		

In eating from the tree Adam and Eve agree with the serpent's assessment of God's character and nature. In their action they are calling God a liar, accusing Him of attempting to deceive them, and control them through His deception.



This attack on God's character makes Adam and Eve enemies of God and results in their being separated form Him. However, God is the source of life so their separation from God brings death to Adam and Eve, and through them to all of humanity.				
All of humanity have become slaves to sin, death, and captives of the Devil, who through his deception rules over us as our captor.

act as mediator between God and creation and creation before its God.		
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If Jesus achieves this in His perfect life then why does He have to die?

As our mediator

"Christ, that gave himself in sacrifice, is so united to them he died for, that it may well be accepted as their sacrifice. It may be accepted of God as if we had offered that price, and justice in Christ's suffering may well be satisfied for our sins; it may be looked upon as though we had suffered because Christ is as we. He laid down his life out of love to us; he has been pleased to unite himself to us in his heart, to love us so as to put himself in our stead in the most extreme case. And he is appointed hereto of the Father. God chose him for our mediator; he is God's elect, and his anointed and sealed. And therefore God looks upon him as our head, and the head being united to the members, the sufferings of the head may be looked upon as the sufferings of the members."

In His perfect life and sinless death on behalf of all humanity as our mediator, Jesus confirms His position as The Son of Man, the one upon whom God bestows all of the promises made to humanity at creation, included in which is the promise of dominion.

Again listen to Edwards here;

"...the sufferings of Christ did not only satisfy justice for our sins, but merited God's favour. Merely by our sins being done away, we stood entitled to no positive blessing at all; we were only freed from obligation to punishment. But Christ's sufferings have not only satisfied and appeased God's anger but they have merited God's favour and eternal life... This was a most glorious act of obedience because it was so expensive. Christ... showed an infinite respect to God's commands in that he would obey it at such infinite expense. And it was therefore meritorious because Christ was not obliged to appear in the form of a servant in such a manner to obey God. It is an act of obedience of infinite value in God's account, and a price sufficient to purchase all those eternal blessings which are promised in the Gospel to believers."
